Don't wait, paying bills is no easier if you shove them to the bottom of the pile, get it over with and start getting the boat ready for the season.

Club sailing started on Sunday 3rd March, almost a month ago! If you're not out, use the Easter Weekend to get your boat ready – and the more often you sail, the more you get out of the subscription you've paid!

BOAT PARKING APPLICATIONS

Don't delay booking your Boat Park place for the coming season. The aim is to make sure active sailors get the most appropriate parking spaces, and boats will only be allowed park in designated spaces. There will be NO parking in aisles.

SDC PARTICIPATE IN ISA DEBATE

Five SDC delegates (**Andy Johnston, Charles Sargent, Eimear Shanahan, Padraig Boyle and Stephen Boyle**) attended the **Irish Sailing Association** (ISA) forum to revitalise small boat sailing and youth training, held on 23rd March in the National Yacht Club (NYC) in Dun Laoghaire. Over 120 sailors from across the country heard important contributions from clubs and classes - the first step on a new blueprint to stem falling numbers in Irish sailing.

Although the contributions varied from the reintroduction of junior log books (**which SDC fully supports**) to coaching support for senior dinghy classes, delegates were united in the view that the Irish Sailing Association (ISA) has to change tack if it wants to properly support the clubs and classes it aims to represent.

Roger Bannon, a former president of the ISA, provided an overview of the problems in small boat sailing and how youth training can be made more relevant to clubs and classes by. He told the meeting there are serious problems with Irish small boat sailing and that important changes are needed, some of them quite fundamental, to ensure the future vibrancy of our sport.

In many ways the packed club house was testament to his concerns that Irish small boat sailing is in trouble. The full extent of the problem was starkly put into focus with the publication earlier this week of information which showed an alarming decline in attendance figures at dinghy championships and falling participation in junior training schemes.

Former president **Paddy Maguire**, who chaired the meeting, asked attendees to make four minute contributions and they

did not need much encouragement with strong contributions from champions, instructors, youth sailors, University team racers, senior dinghy sailors, sailmakers, sailing school owners, club commodores and junior organisers. Contributions from delegates (including Andy and Padraig for SDC, and Charles on behalf of the IDRA 14 Class) included observations relevant to SDC such as:

- *Numbers participating in dinghy and small one design boats are steadily declining in both youth and adult classes. There are some exceptions, mainly in older traditional classes but unfortunately, this decline represents a fundamental underlying overall trend.*
- *The retention rate of junior sailors in the sport, after emerging from our training schemes, is alarmingly low, at less than 10%. The expected natural progression of youth sailors into adult classes as they mature is also low.*
- *The general standard of racing and boat handling skills in most adult classes is also considerably below acceptable levels and certainly much lower than in prior decades.*
- *The justified emphasis placed on elite sailing has been implemented at the expense of improving standards generally and supporting international participation in non-pathway approved classes to improve skill levels.*
- *It is expensive to obtain qualifications to become an Instructor, and this disincentivises many who might be excellent candidates.*

Those attending submitted written suggestions as to how these issues can be addressed - the meeting ended with a commitment from the ISA to publish its report and action plan.

ALL-ROUND OPTIMIST SAILORS!

It has been a busy winter sailing for some of us Oppy sailors. I qualified for the Optimist Trials, which gave me the opportunity to take up a place for a second year on the OPG team. This is made up of sailors from a number of clubs in Dublin Bay. The sailors mainly come from **Howth**, the **National** and the **Royal St. George Yacht Clubs**, and I am the only Sutton Dinghy Club sailor. It has been a very cold and windy spell but we got a lot of experience of all weathers on the water. We had two coaches from the UK - these guys focused a lot on fitness training, on and off the water. This is to prepare us for the Optimist National Trials for teams. So I hope more SDC sailors will push themselves a little harder and make trails to open the doors of opportunity, to expand your sailing experiences, and to meet new friends along the way!

This year to kick off the season in February we had a squad of four SDC sailors: **Isabel, Rory, Dylan** and myself attended the International Optimist Dinghy Association in Ireland (IODAI) spring training week in Baltimore. This year SDC Junior Affairs Officer **Mandy Kelly** organised the event on behalf of IODAI, and proudly represented Sutton.

-----<>----- THE INTERNATIONAL "TWELVE"

*The Sutton Dinghy Club burgee features an **International 12 foot Dinghy**, designed by **George Cockshott**, an amateur boat designer from Southport 100 years ago. This boat became the first one-design racing dinghy to gain international recognition. It appeared on Irish waters in the Royal Munster Yacht Club in 1923, and it was introduced to Dublin Bay at Seapoint Boat Club in 1925. In 1931, the **Keating family** started sailing their "Twelve" in Sutton Creek, leading to the formation of SDC in 1940.*

The squad had a great week on and off the water experiencing coaching from ten different international coaches and some top Irish coaches like **Ger Owens** and **Diana Kissane**. They taught us a lot of new skills and helped us improve old ones. The days were long with training in the morning and racing in the afternoon, with some challenges, but the hot chocolate was amazing after a long day on the water! Then we headed to the shore-based activities laid on for the evenings, like the swimming pool, discos and pizza nights. The conditions on the water were really good most days for gaining a variety of skills, however on the Wednesday it was gusting 35 knots and we got 3 races in the afternoon. Overall we think it's a great week for Optimists sailors to attend as you gain a lot of new skills, and confidence to push yourself out to race on the circuit in events; and you meet people who will be your friends for life.

The SDC squad are training in Sutton this Easter break with one of the top Irish optimist coaches, **Ger Owens**. So watch out - we plan to win a lot of prizes at home and at away events this season!

-----<>----- - CELEBRATING 100 YEARS

*Although virtually forgotten in the Ireland and the UK, the class still enjoys an enthusiastic and sizeable following in the Netherlands, Italy and Japan, and is regaining popularity elsewhere. Special events are planned for this centenary year, including a June 28-30 return to **West Kirby Sailing Club**, where the first-ever race for 12' Dinghies was sailed in October 1913. Sutton veteran sailors **Aidan Henry** and **Billy Bebbington** will be there, flying our burgee and sailing "**Dorado**", built 1932.*
